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## Dr Charles Kennard, Timpani

Thanks for the opportunity to toot my own horn, or, in this case, beat my own drum! I have been playing timpani for the BCO for about 3 years. I was a serious timpani student and performer in high school–also I was the timpanist for the Metropolitan Youth Symphony Orchestra of Chicago, but, after one semester of ensemble performance at Indiana University, I found my interest in biology and my calling to become a physician.

The academic requirements of my undergraduate and medical school courses left no time for playing music. I took an internship in internal medicine at the Mayo Clinic, a residency in dermatology at the University of Michigan and a fellowship in skin cancer surgery at the University of Iowa.

Reflecting on my career choice, which I thoroughly loved, I see similarities with being an orchestral musician: everyone has to be a highly accomplished specialist, but teamwork and respect for one's colleagues is necessary to achieve the best result!

After a stint in the US Air Force Medical Corps, I settled in North Texas with my family. My oldest daughter "volunteered" me for the

It is clearly evident that they found a perfect balance between a mother's wishes and a young boy's dreams.

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Southlake Community Band and I quickly realized that I had been missing the thrills and challenges of performing music.

I took some private lessons and played with various community bands and orchestras over a twenty year span. When the opportunity to play timpani with the BCO became available, it was a dream come true! I love playing the timpani because of the drama the drums impart to the orchestra.

After 36 years in medicine, I retired in 2022. Playing with the BCO, the Fort Worth Civic Orchestra, the Mansfield Wind Symphony, and various church assignments has kept me challenged and very busy.

I have two adult daughters and five grandchildren who live out of state. I also enjoy cycling and traveling.



David's mother started taking voice lessons from a member of the Philadelphia Opera Chorus and often took him to dress rehearsals. Can't you just see it? Little David seated behind the conductor—his arms cutting through the air mimicking the conductor and dodging glances from his occupied mother—not sure if these were of approval or otherwise. Most musicians and other performers understand just how much their talents affect people—make them feel the emotions of the performance—and instill dreams of wakening yet to be discovered talents.

During the latest BCO concert in Cleburne, seated a few rows in front of me, a young girl was doing the same—her arms slicing through the air keeping time with the music. A seed was planted; thankfully, no one told her to sit still.

Without detailing his full resume, David studied voice, piano, music education, and completed doctoral studies in conducting. He is one of those fortunate folks who is living his dream—even his high school yearbook notes that he planned to follow a musical career after graduation. The communities of Cleburne, Burleson, and Granbury are certainly glad he did.
